Proposed gateway organisation for the Midwest >

Key Indigenous community, Industry and Government representatives have come together to form the Midwest Regional Partnership Steering Committee.

The Steering Committee has met to discuss a number of issues relating to Indigenous employment and training, including a proposed Indigenous Gateway for the Midwest.

Indigenous Gateway


It is proposed that Bundiyarra Aboriginal Corporation act as a contact point for employers and other organisations who want to speak with Indigenous organisations in the Mid-West. Bundiyarra would provide a one-stop-shop for non-Indigenous corporations, businesses and bodies to get information about who to approach for their needs.

In the next 3 to 4 weeks the Committee will be seeking to gain support from the State Government to develop the concept and will be encouraging native title claimants in the Mid West, Murchison regions to participate.

Indigenous Employment

The Steering Committee has also tabled the development of a Regional Indigenous Employment Strategy to enhance Indigenous employment and enterprise outcomes emerging from the mining industry. This initiative is being supported and driven by the Indigenous community in partnership with key industry groups, which includes the Geraldton Iron Ore Alliance and is supported by government agencies.

Gascoyne Aboriginal Heritage and Cultural Centre >

The Gascoyne Aboriginal Heritage and Cultural Centre in Carnarvon is nearing readiness to open to the public. Furniture has been arriving and the fit-out of the Centre is almost complete.

Part of the fit-out for the Centre is three business incubator pods for Indigenous people who might have a great idea for a cultural tourism business that they want to start. The pods consist of a desk equipped with a computer and a phone to help get their venture off the ground.

An artist-in-residence space is being established to host a program of local artists and craftspeople who can spend some time working out of the Centre and exhibiting their creations.

A small retail space will enable a mix of locally made and other Indigenous products available to the general public for sale.

The Cultural Centre has been a long time in the making. The result of a 2002 native title agreement to open up land for housing in Carnarvon, it is a testament to the vision, hard work and long-term commitment of many Gascoyne Indigenous people.

Increasing Indigenous Employment>

The City of Geraldton-Greenough's Reconciliation Committee, which was formed on 29 May 2008, consists of representatives from;

- Department of Child Protection
- Indigenous Coordination Centre
- Yamaji News
- Department of Indigenous Affairs
- Streetworkers Aboriginal Corporation
- Geraldton University Centre

Investigations have revealed that no WA Local Governments have written Aboriginal employment policies and guidelines in place. Therefore, the Reconciliation Committee is drafting an Aboriginal Employment Policy to submit to Council.

It is intended that the policy will be accompanied by an Aboriginal employment strategy that will eventually lead to more Aboriginal people being employed by the Council.

WGM Pty Ltd was created to represent Wiluna and Midwest Aboriginal people in their negotiations to support regional-based businesses.

Gumala is a leading Indigenous development organisation based in the Pilbara and employing over 100 staff. Gumala's business interests include civil construction, contract mining, property management and tourism development.

Gumala's chairman Mr Stuart Injie said "Gumala and WGM will work together to ensure 'win win' outcomes that result in better living standards and opportunities for Traditional Owners in the Midwest."

WGM Chairman Jim Sandy said "A long consultation process with local Indigenous groups has been undertaken and that consultation will continue." A Memorandum of Understanding between WGM and Gumala was signed on Thursday August 28.

In October, Yamatji Land and Sea Council will be holding community consultation workshops to talk about changes that need to be made to the Land Council's constitution. The constitution changes are being made because of new Government legislation about the way Aboriginal Corporations are run*.

The community workshops will be held from the 6-10th of October in Geraldton, Carnarvon, Meekatharra, Mount Magnet and Perenjori. The workshops are a chance for all Land Council members and native title claimants to learn about the proposed changes. A special general meeting to vote on the changes will be held in Exmouth on the 8th of November.
